Riding The Storms Out

Clarksville resident Bud Garrison paddles Sunday over a flooded Highway 79 to reach his house, where a fierce storm Saturday night drowned what he believes was a 100-year-old oak tree in his yard (seen at right). The high winds also damaged buildings and downed power lines. Residents were asked to conserve water and remain off the streets as crews worked to restore power. Around 600 residents were affected by power outages according to Amana. Governor Mike Parson visited Clarksville on Monday, June 3 to survey the conditions and discuss the town's needs with Mayor Johnnie Smiley. Also attending the meeting were Senator Cindy O'Leigh, State Representative Jim Hansen and several local officials.

Clarksville Battles Storm As Well As Flooding

Clarksville continues to show its indomitable spirit. Two months of fighting the Mississippi River to its second-highest level in the town's 202-year history came with an extra whammy over the weekend. A storm that blew through with heavy rain and high winds Saturday night caused property damage and power outages. The Clarksville Apartments along First Street were damaged when debris kicked up by what witnesses called tornado-like winds landed on the roof. There were no injuries or evacuations, but downed lines left many residents of the Clarksville and Painesville areas without electricity. Ameren Missouri crews restored power to most homes Sunday. It was estimated that almost 800 residents were affected by the outages. City officials urged residents to remain in their homes and asked folks to avoid coming to town so the streets could be clear for crews to conduct necessary work. See BATTLES on page 10

Governor Examines Flood Conditions In Clarksville

Mayor Urges Passage Of Funding To Help Purchase Flood Control System

APRIL M. FROENCK • EDITOR april@thepeopletribune.com Clarksville has been battling flood conditions for two months now and has already spent over \$75,000. Following a rough weekend that saw a new record set in Clarksville with the crest at 37.1 feet on June 2 (second-highest recorded), the town was visited by Governor Mike Parson on Monday. The governor wanted to see the flood conditions and hear from local officials. Mayor Johnnie Smiley was more than prepared with a pitch to obtain \$2 million in funding for a flood control system. She also had pieces of the temporary flood wall to show the governor to demonstrate how it would work. The \$20 flood control system works a lot like Legos. A permanent foundation is set. When flood conditions predict, the wall can be erected in less than two days by less than 10 people. The complete installation and purchase of the system is \$4 million. The city has examined every type of flood wall system and this is superior in every way. It can be taken down and stored in its own pod (which means a new building is not needed for storage). This temporary system means the city can continue to promote the most beautiful unrestricted views of the Mississippi River. More importantly, the city would no longer need to purchase large amounts of materials that are temporary such as rock and sand. There would also not be the need for so much volunteer efforts. "It would make us more independent," she explained. "It is the best system by far." The state legislature has already approved a bill dedicating \$2 million to the project - it just needs the signature of the governor to become reality. See FLOOD on page 11

Guests are encouraged to complete surveys, rating the facility, management and operation. 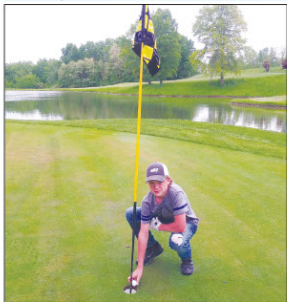

Each person has a title and many have titles such as mother, friend, teacher or artist. Kayla McBride now has a title she never expected - breast cancer survivor. Although it is a title she wasn't expecting, especially at age 36, Kayla feels blessed to have survived her journey and is humbled by the outpouring of support she and her family received.

In September of 2018 Kayla discovered a lump during a self-breast exam. Kayla scheduled an appointment with Dr. Laura Maple who immediately had Kayla get a mammogram and breast ultrasound. After receiving the results of both

tests Kayla was referred to Dr. Stacey Copeland the next day to undergo a breast biopsy. Once the biopsy came back it was confirmed that Kayla had stage two breast cancer. Kayla underwent mastectomy in October of 2018 and started chemotherapy treatments at Hannibal Regional Infusion Center in November.

"When we were beginning treatments several people asked why we didn't go somewhere else for treatment. We told people we had a great deal of trust and confidence in Dr. Copeland and Dr. Kristen Strasser and the treatment path we had cho-

sen," shares Kayla. "We had the ability to successfully treat my cancer close to home, which made it easier to deal with. Having two young children at home, it was important to beat home as much as possible."

Once Kayla's chemotherapy treatments began the team at the Infusion Center began to feel like family. "The team at the Infusion Center was always there to support me and help me get through the hard times. When we first started treatments Dr. Strasser took the time to explain the options to me and helped find the right plan for me."

"One of the most important things I could say to others fighting cancer is to make sure you find ways to smile. Whether it is just because of a silly moment or a joke - don't forget to find joy," shares Kayla. "I also encourage others to remember their self-exams and to remember they are their own best advocate."

Kayla is now done with treatments and is grateful to have the title of survivor. "Kicking the ball at the end of my treatments was a wonderful day. Dr. Strasser even found me a going to ring because I had told her about seeing that somewhere else," says Kayla. "It is a little bittersweet to be done with treatments because I will miss seeing the team at the Infusion Center. However, I will always be thankful for their wonderful care and support when I needed them most."

Health Department Reminds Area To Stay Safe Against Poisonous Items

According to the CDC three hundred children are seen in emergency rooms and two die as a result of poisoning in America daily. Children are naturally curious and sometimes get into things that they shouldn't. It's not just candy or household items in your home that are poisonous. Plants, medications, batteries, personal care items (such as perfume and e-cigarette liquid), herbal supplements and many other items can be deadly if ingested. Toddlers are especially at risk due to their skin absorbing chemicals more rapidly than adults or older children, and their smaller body size. Older children and teens are also at risk for poisoning, but are more likely to intentionally ingest something that is poisonous, or is poisonous if taken in too large a quantity.

Some tips for preventing poisoning from healthychildren.org:

- Store medicine, cleaning and laundry products, (including detergent packets) paints, antiseptics and pesticides in their original packaging in locked cabinets or containers, out of sight and reach of children. It is best to use traditional liquid or powder laundry detergents instead of detergent packets until all children who live in or visit your home are at least 6 years old.
- Safety latches that automatically lock when you close a cabinet door

can help to keep children away from dangerous products, but there is always a chance the device will malfunction or the child will defeat it. The safest place to store poisonous products is somewhere a child can't see or reach.

- Purchase and keep all medicines in containers with safety caps. Discard unused medication. Note that safety caps are designed to be child resistant but are not fully child proof.
- Never refer to medicine as "candy" or another appealing name.
- Check the label each time you give a child medicine to ensure proper dosage. For liquid medicines, use the dosing device that came with the medicine. Never use a kitchen spoon. Watch the video, The Healthy Children Show: Giving/Liquid Medicine Safely, for more information.

- If you use an e-cigarette, keep the liquid nicotine refills locked up out of children's reach and only buy refills that use child-resistant packaging. A small amount of liquid nicotine spilled on the skin or swallowed can be fatal to a child. See Liquid Nicotine Used in E-Cigarettes Can Kill Children.
- Never place poisonous products in food or drink containers.
- Keep natural gas-powered appliances, furnaces, and coal, wood or

kerosene stoves in safe working order.

- Maintain working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.
- Secure remote controls, key fobs, greeting cards, and musical children's books. These and other devices may contain small button-cell batteries that can cause injury if ingested.
- Know the names of all plants in your home and yard. If you have young children or pets, consider removing those that are poisonous.

The National Poison Control Center (1-800-222-1222) is free, confidential and open 24/7. They are there to answer your questions and concerns. They can advise you on what is poisonous and what to do if you think someone has been poisoned. If the person collapses, has a seizure, has trouble breathing or can't be awakened call 911 right away. You can also visit their website at www.poison.org. The Pike County Health Department has a supply of poison control stickers and magnets, as well as green Mr. Yuck stickers to mark items that are poisonous.

Contact Stefania Davis, Environmentalist at 573-324-2111 x113 or stop by the Health Department to pick some up. Poisoning is preventable.

NECAC Offers Summer Energy Assistance

The not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) is urging qualified applicants to sign up for summer energy assistance.

The seasonal portion of the Energy Crisis Intervention Program (ECIP) began June 1. The program will continue until this year's \$408,943 of assistance runs out or the program ends Sept. 30.

ECIP pays overdue electricity bills of up to \$300 for income-qualifying households. It is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and is distributed through the Missouri Department of Social Services, which then contracts with NECAC to administer the program in Lewis, Lincoln, Mason, Marion, Monroe, Montgomery, Pike, Ralls, Randolph, St. Charles, Shelby and Warren counties. NECAC's \$408,943 allocation is up slightly from \$382,130 last year.

*Participants must have received

a utility shut-off notice for electric service," said NECAC Supervisor Angela Kattambakur. "If they received assistance from the winter portion of the program through NECAC and did not move, all that will be needed is the shut-off notice. Those who are new to the program, have moved and those who did not participate in the winter portion must fill out additional paperwork."

In 2018, assistance was provided to 2,356 households in 12 counties, up from 2,029 in summer 2017. People may sign up or request more information by calling or visiting the following NECAC County Service Centers:

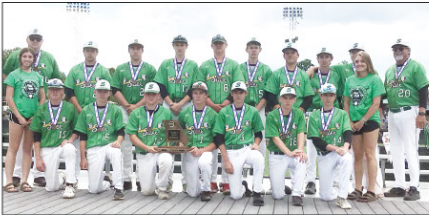

Smiley asked if Gov. Parson could commit to signing off on the budget item, but he declined to announce a decision. He promised that he would take a hard look at it and make a decision soon.

Smiley pointed out the president of EKO has visited Clarkville many times and has helped her present the plans at the state level. While it is a German company, it was first used in Nashville, Tenn., to secure the Grand Ole Opry and has been utilized in North Dakota and on the east coast following the effects of Hurricane Sandy. The company now manufactures in the United States.

The system has a total price tag of \$4 million. The city is unable to obtain federal funding until state monies have been established. Mayor Smiley said she felt confident that if the \$2 million is approved, getting the remaining financing will not be a problem.

The city has already spent over \$75,000 out of an already stretched budget. These are expenditures that were not planned.

Rep. Jim Hansen pointed out during the Governor's visit this is not the first time that money has been requested for this project and the price tag only increases. He pointed out that system is an investment that will more than pay for itself in a

very short period of time. Gov. Parson asked if the city could limit the system to other cities in crisis when not in use.

Mayor Smiley pointed out that a permanent foundation is required and it isn't something the city would be fond of, but that it could be possible.

This year's flood now occupies four spots in the top ten recorded floods for Clarkville. The highest is still 37.73 in 1993, but it was 37.1-foot on Sunday to claim the second spot. The 36.76-foot crest of April 24, 1973 is number three and the 36.71-foot crest on May 30 is now number four.

The flood of 2008 has moved down to number five on the list at 36.70-foot. Right behind that is the 35.93-foot crest on May 4. The 34.08-foot crest of April 1 of this year is number 10.

So far the city has brought in over 900 tons of sand, 3,300 tons of rock among the materials. Numerous families have had to evacuate their homes.

The post office and bank are now under water and there are questions about how much more the buildings can take without a dependable flood control system.

It was also pointed out that over 3,500 meals have been served at the United Methodist Church and volunteers there have more than 1,500 hours invested.

The city has received assistance from the National Guard, AmeriCorps, Northeast Correctional Center, the Women's Eastern Reception, Diagnostic and Correctional Center and students from three different school districts.

Residents were also asked to conserve water until power was restored. Generators were brought in by the State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) to help keep public works operating.

The river level stood Monday morning at just over 37 feet and is

expected to drop. Volunteers have built a sandbag levee to withstand a 38-foot level. The record is 37.7 feet in 1993.

Clarkville has had seven of its top 10 floods in the last 18 years. Three of the crests have taken place this year alone.

Highway 79 is closed in six Pike County locations and the Champ Clark Bridge at Louisiana remains closed due to flooding on the Illinois approach.

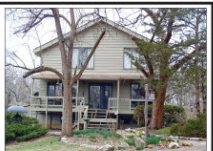
