Committee Shares Details About Bridge Ceremony

Descendent Of Champ Clark To Be Guest Speaker

In just a little over a week, several hundred people are expected to walk on the new Champ Clark Bridge for the first time.

All are invited to attend the bridge dedication ceremony on Saturday, Aug. 3, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Ben Clark, great-grandson of the Honorable Champ Clark, for whom the bridge is named, will be the featured speaker. Missouri Department of Transportation Director Patrick McKenna, Illinois Secretary of Transportation Omar Osman, and Henry J. Masman, President, Masman Construction Company, the design-builder, also will speak, along with U.S. Congressman Sam Graves from Missouri.

The new bridge will open soon after the ceremony concludes. All details of the ceremony can be found online at www.champclarkbridge.com.

Those attending the ceremony can park at the Louisiana High School, where school buses will shuttle them to the end of the new bridge. Shuttle will begin at 5:15 p.m. At that point, attendees can walk to the middle of the bridge

where the ceremony is to take place, or if they need assistance, golf carts will be available to give them rides. Should the high school parking lot fill up, overflow parking will be at the school ball fields off of Kelly Lane behind the high school, and parking signs will be alongside the streets to help direct traffic. Law enforcement and city personnel will assist in guiding traffic. Attendees using wheelchairs can be dropped off in front of Ayer at the U.S. Route 54 and MO 79 intersection at the end of the bridge. The public will be allowed on the bridge beginning at 5 p.m.

Anyone interested in getting photos of the new and old bridge, before the old bridge comes down, is encouraged to walk up to Riverview Park that evening and take "selfies." Beginning at 5 p.m., several food vendors, from both sides of the river, will be offering items for sale.

"There is a nice place to sit and if the weather cooperates, it will make for an enjoyable setting," said Kristi Pitzer, Louisiana Chamber of Commerce director who is also helping coordinate the event.

Musician Sees Bridge Dedication As Way To Shine Spotlight On History

David Hungate has been on many stages, but this one he'll be looking at with an eye on its important legacy.

It's the dignitary platform at the dedication for the new Champ Clark Bridge in Louisiana at 6:30 p.m. Aug. 3. The retired musician's parent, the late William and Dorothy Hungate, are credited with saving Clark's landmark Bowling Green home, Honyshuck.

Hungate had planned to attend. A recent back injury remains painful and likely will cause him to miss the ceremony, but he promises to be there in spirit.

"I've always supported Honyshuck, and I feel that I'm representing my parents," said the 70-year-old former bass player for the rock band Toto. "It will be a historic event, and should be fun as well."

In addition to politics and music, Congressman William Hungate had an affinity for Pike County heritage. He grew up in Bowling Green steeped in admiration for Clark and Honyshuck, named for the loocst tree pods found in the yard.

In 1973, William and Dorothy bought the Folk Victorian and Carpenter Gothic house and turned it over to the non-profit foundation: Champ Clark Honyshuck Restoration Inc.

"Anyone with a regard for the importance of history would be grateful for what they did," David Hungate said. "My Dad was a lover of history -- particularly political history, particularly Missouri political history -- with a focus on Pike County. My parents, and most of that generation of people who saved Honyshuck, are no longer here. It's up to us and future generations to see that the work goes on."

As with so many, Hungate is frustrated that Clark was denied the 1912 Democrat presidential nomination. Clark was Speaker of the House and led through much of the balloting at the party convention in Baltimore, but couldn't quite reach the required two-thirds majority.

William Jennings Bryan, a former friend of Clark's, led the campaign to back Woodrow Wilson. The New Jersey governor won the nomination and went on to defeat Republican in-

cumbent William Howard Taft and third party candidate Theodore Roosevelt.

"This loss of the presidential nomination in 1912, or the way it was essentially stolen from him, is a lesson in the fact that life isn't always fair," Hungate said. "When that wronged soul is a member of your own community, lives in your own small town, the grievance becomes more personal, and more painful. It doesn't require an excess of empathy for us to feel it still, or understand how it felt. To those directly involved, it must have been a tragedy of Shakespearean dimensions."

Clark still has a message for people today because he "believed in the essential goodness of the common people," Hungate says. Clark approved of the direct election of senators, diminution of the electoral college and was an early supporter of women's suffrage. He also worked to unite urban and rural interests, opposed American involvement in World War I and backed a more flexible currency system.

Funeral Etiquette: You just don't know what to say or aren't sure of the best way to approach the grieving person that you'll like to speak with. As a mourner, you will likely be confronted by many questions and just don't know the proper funeral etiquette for handling certain difficult situations.

What do you say to someone who has just lost a loved one and how do you support them?

Whether you call, send a card or flowers, or visit, the important thing is to make a gesture that lets the family know you're thinking of them and share their sorrow. While times are changing and proper funeral etiquette is evolving, texts, emails, and tweets are still too informal for expressing sympathy. It is still much better to reach out using traditional communication methods such as a telephone call or hand written note.

Offering Condolences Top 3 Things Not To Say Attending Services

When hearing the news...

Be a good listener. Let friends and family talk about their loved one and their death. If they don't want to talk about it, don't pressure them. Focus on the survivor's needs.

"After he is deceased by name and acknowledge the person's life."

"I've used clothing phrases such as 'he or she is in a better place.' Instead, speak from your heart in your own words."

Learn more - how do I handle awkward questions about the death? Be prepared to hear words that are painful to hear and may seem inappropriate, such as, "You'll get over it." "It was her time," or, "I know exactly how you feel because I lost my life Christmas last week." While these types of questions may be bad funeral etiquette, understand that many people just aren't sure what to say or how to say it.

Expect many questions regarding the circumstances of your loved one's passing, especially if it was sudden, unexpected, or involved an accident. Be prepared with a brief response and remember that you are obligated to tell the entire story. Most people simply want to give you an opportunity to talk, although you may cross paths with those whose morbid curiosity won't be satisfied without hearing every detail. Including the cause of death in the obituary, if appropriate, can alleviate some of these questions.

Above all, it is possible, be gracious to all who express sympathy regardless of how inconsiderate or unfeeling their remarks might appear. They will someday be in your place and understand that it isn't inappropriate.

Doing nothing, or pretending it didn't happen, is not good etiquette.

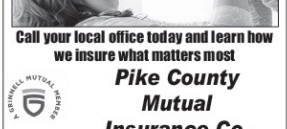

MoDOT Plans Pavement Work For Pike County

Weather permitting, MoDOT will be doing the following pavement work in Pike County. Please see the dates and locations below.

Pike County Route UJ - July 29, the road will be reduced to one lane traffic from U.S. Route 54 to Pike County Route VV for pavement operations. The work will be completed between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. that day.

Pike County Route VV - July 30, the road will be reduced to one lane traffic from Route UU to CRD 130 for pavement operations. The work will be completed between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. that day.

Pike County Route UU - July 30, the road will be reduced to one lane traffic from Route VV to Business Route 61 north for pavement operations. The work will be completed between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. that day.

Pike County Route UVV - July 31, the road will be reduced to one lane traffic from U.S. Route 61

to U.S. Route 54 for sealing operations. The work will be completed between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. that day.

William Hungate played a key role in the impeachment effort against Republican President Richard Nixon. He sponsored the second article of impeachment that alleged Nixon disregarded his constitutional duty to uphold the law. Nixon resigned before he could be impeached.

Hungate also was chairman of the subcommittee that investigated President Gerald Ford's pardon of Nixon. The subcommittee voted against pursuing charges, with Hungate voting in the majority.

Though still very much interested in politics, Hungate says he's not seriously considered seeking office. "Unlike many current members of Congress, I know I'm not qualified," he jokes.

As far as music, Hungate says hitting the road is "a young man's game and people who stick around too long can look foolish." Still, he has "many good memories of my experience with Toto, and of the other music" he was involved with in a career that spanned five decades.

The music business taught me that politics is not only played electorally," he said.

Hungate was an original member of Toto, which had hits with "Hold the Line," "Rosanna" and "Africa." Lesser known is his session and touring work with just about everybody who was anybody in rock, pop and country music. A shortened version of the long list includes Dolly Parton, Bryan Adams, Seals & Crofts, Reba McEntire, Glen Campbell, George Strait, Tanya Tucker, Linda Ronstadt, Neil Diamond, Judy Collins, Kenny Rogers, Barbara Streisand, Chet Atkins, Willie Nelson, Diana Ross, Shania Twain, Boyz n the City, Vince Gill and Joe Cockier.

"I occasionally play guitar in my living room for my own amusement, but no longer accept sessions or tour offers," Hungate said. "I'm working on a book about my experiences, maintaining our farm and enjoying my grandchildren."

Despite avoiding the stage and recording studio, Hungate hasn't lost his sense of humor. He can't help but get in a good-natured jab at a legendary band of septagenarians that is touring again this summer.

"I don't know if this counts, but I

have been offered a contract to provide adult diapers to the Rolling Stones," he quipped.

Not surprisingly, Hungate is not thrilled with today's music trends.

"I can't remember the last time I heard a new song that impressed me," he said. "I know age plays a part in that, but I can objectively say that in terms of melodic and harmonic content, lyrical depth, vocal ability, instrumental talent and creative production, most modern popular music is a far cry from that of the past."

Hungate believes music "seems to be less important to young people

today than it was to earlier generations." He then explains why before adding an "old man" twist.

"It didn't use to have to compete with the internet, video games and 300 channels of cable. They demand less of it and it's become a kind of fashion accessory. Now, you kids get off my lawn!"

Though he may not be able to make it to Louisiana on Aug. 3, the bridge dedication is right up Hungate's alley.

"It will be a historic and entertaining event," he said. "If history is any indication, it might not happen again for another 90 years. I hope there is a big crowd. Champ deserves it."

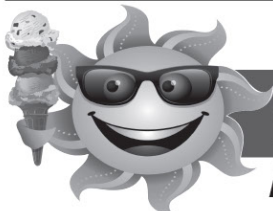
