Clerk Susie Oberdahlhoff is in reference to the delay in results of the recent election held Tuesday, Aug. 4.

The security and integrity of local elections is the highest priority of the county clerk's office.

Extra safeguards were put in place to ensure that voters of Pike County received a fair election. Due to two county clerk office staff members appearing themselves on the ballot, a smaller number of staff thus slowing down the process.

The two staff members on the ballot had their usual roles altered to put them in positions where no undue influence could be placed on voting results.

While these safeguards resulted in a delay, the county clerk office is confident that a fair election took place and that the integrity of the process was protected.

"After much consideration and discussion, in addition to seeking the advice of Pike County Health Department concerning the COVID-19 pandemic, the board of directors of the Bowling Green Chamber of Commerce has determined that it would be in the best interest of the public to postpone the 2020 Heritage Festival," the Bowling Green Chamber of Commerce released last

But the organization hasn't given up on holding events in the city. They hope to combine the festival with another event in November.

itor the health situation but is tentatively planning to combine the Heritage Festival with the annual Holly Jolly event. This combined event would possibly be held at the end of November. Vendors and sponsors who have already registered for the Heritage Festival will be allowed to choose whether to transfer their registration to the potential combined event or to receive

The Louisiana Chamber of Commerce made a similar decision recently by canceling to the fall Colorfest.

"Thank you for your understanding as the board made this difficult decision," The Bowling Green Chamber closed their statement.

According to the document re-leased on July 31st, The Pike County R-III School District is committed to providing quality education to all students.

"The district values a safe learning environment for students and employees. Many of these concepts are precautionary and done out of respect for those who are considered at-risk or are immuno compromised. The COVID-19 guidelines developed and presented below follow applicable guidelines during the time it was written."

Students and Staff will be required to self-screen for COVID-19 symptoms before coming to school each day. Those displaying symptoms are told to stay home and con-

tact the school as soon as possible. Students can expect assigned

seating in the cafeteria and on buses. Upon arrival at the school, students from kindergarten to fifth They will be sent to breakfast per mind students to wash or sanitize routine. Students from six-12 grades

"This age group will report di-rectly to their first class after finishing breakfast. Students will not be allowed to socialize or congregate on campus at this time," the plan

may go directly to the breakfast line.

Regarding face masks, students from second through 12th grade will be required to wear a face-covering or mask when social distancing cannot occur. "Students should bring a mask or face covering from home based on the comfort and preference of their parent or guardian."

Classrooms and restrooms will be cleaned throughout the school day and students will be required to wash their hands multiple times throughout the day. "Additional signage will be posted in an effort to reregularly." Social distancing in class will be

utilized as much as possible, but the school will have other options for parents or guardians still uncomfortable with their student's returning to in-person classrooms. Parents have the option of sending their students to the in-person classes or virtual learning for sixth

through 12th grades and a mixture

of packets, online curriculum, and virtual events for PK through 5th Families wishing to take part in the virtual learning option will need to contact the building level principal for their student before 9 a.m. on

2020 Back To School Fair Hands Out 650 Backpacks

Volunteers with the Pike County Community Cares Partnership (PCCP) gathered early Saturday morning to hand out 650 back-packs filled with school supplies.

The Back 2 School Fair has taken place since 2009 to help children start the school year with the proper supplies. The PCCP is a collaborative of organizations and community partnerships in Pike County who are committed to ensuring the county's children are prepared for a bright future through strong parental involvement and support.

In previous years, the event has also held additional activities along with providing free backpacks and school supplies; However, the organization opted for drive-thru style pickup due to COVID-19 safety concerns.

The event was held outside the Pike County Fairgrounds 4-H building where volunteers stood ready under canopies hoping predicted storms would hold off. Luckily,it did although organizers kicked off the event slightly early at 7:40 a.m.,

"We started passing out at about 7:40 a.m., and ran out of packed bags around 9:45 a.m.," Katherine Branstetter the PCCP's chair stated. "After that we handed out backpacks with no supplies to last people who came at 10 a.m."

The event drew large numbers with a line of cars stretching as far back as the fairground entrance and parking area. Branstetter believed the turnout was greater than previous years since attendees could pick up for other people and the children did not have to be with them.

Despite that long line, the group kept things moving efficiently by

backpacks - already filled with grade-appropriate supplies – lined on tables for easy distribution.

Kim Lumley with Pike County Senate Bill 40 and PCHD Administrator Rhonda Stumbaugh handed out simple registration forms along the line of vehicles while a Pike Community Care Partnership chair Katherine Branstetter and several volunteers from PCHD and PCMH handed out the bags.

Before the event, participants and staff with the Pike County Agency for Developmental Disabilities took on the pain-staking task of staging and packing the650 bags with school supplies for students ranging from Pre-K to high school levels.

The event lasted until all the backpacks were handed out on a first-come/first-serve basis.

"It went so smooth and would like to thank all the volunteers who gave of their time to support this event," Katherine Branstetter said. 'Special thanks to the Pike county Hospital and the Pike County Health Department and PCADD whose clients packed the bags. It is a community event and community supported."

The organization relies on donations from throughout the area but did not send out requests this year due to the impact cornavirus had on community's

businesses, churches, and organizations. But there is still a need for donations to ensure the non-profit's ongoing success. "We are still accepting donations as letters were not sent out this year due to Covid-19," Branstetter added.

Jzyeshawn Palmer, 17, of Mexico also arrived at SSM-Audrain and had a gunshot wound to the leg from the same incident.


He was taken to University Hospital for further treatment.



USDA Extends Deadlines, Defers **Interest Accrual Due To COVID-19**

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Risk Management Agency (RMA) announced Wednesday, Aug. 5 it will authorize Approved Insurance Providers (AIPs) to extend deadlines for premium and administrative fee payments, defer the resulting interest accrual and allow other flexibilities to help farmers, ranchers, and insurance providers due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

"USDA recognizes farmers and ranchers have been severely affected by the COVID-19 Pandemic this year and to help ease the burden on these folks, we are continuing to extend flexibility for producers," said U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue. "The flexibilities announced today support health and safety while also ensuring the Federal crop insurance program continues to serve as a vital risk management

Background: Specifically, USDA is authorizing AIPs to provide policyholders additional time to pay premium and administrative fees and to waive accrual of interest to the earlier of 60 days after their scheduled payment due date or the termination date on

policies with premium billing dates between August 1, 2020, and September 30, 2020. In addition, USDA is authorizing AIPs to provide up to an additional 60 days for policyholders to make payment and waive additional interest for Written Payment Agreements due between August 1, 2020, and September 30, 2020.

RMA is authorizing additional flexibilities due to coronavirus while continuing to support producers, working through AIPs to deliver services, including processing policies, claims and agreements. RMA staff are working with AIPs and other customers by phone, mail and electronically to continue supporting crop insurance coverage for producers. Farmers with crop insurance questions or needs should continue to contact their insurance agents about conducting business remotely (by telephone or email). More information can be found farmers.gov/coronavirus.

Crop insurance is sold and delivered solely through private insurance agents. A list of insurance agents is available online using the RMA Agent Locator. Learn more about crop insurance and the modern farm safety net at rma.usda.gov.

More than 400 species of bees can be found in Missouri and the populations of a number of these species are in trouble. That's concerning because these bees provide a number of benefits to humans.

People wanting to learn more about the variety of bees found in Missouri and how to attract these valuable insects to their yards can get information at the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) free virtual program "Hotel for Bees." This online program will be 2-2:30 p.m. on Aug. 14 and is being put on by the staff of MDC's Cape Girardeau Conservation Nature Center. This program is designed for all ages. 





Ellsworth has been charged with felony tampering with evidence. She is being held in the Macon County Iail

While information is still limited, officials from the Missouri State Highway Patrol (MSHP) stated the investigation was ongoing and more would be released.

According to MSHP Sgt. Eric Brown stated that Monroe City Police responded to a call to investigate Johnston's home Wednesday afternoon around 1:30 p.m. after one of herfriends went to visit and found signs of a break-in and Johnston missing.

After the initial investigation, the Monroe City Police Department determined she was possibly the victim of a violent crime and requested assistance from MSHP leading to the mobilization of the Northeast Missouri Major Case Squad.

Officers now believe Asbell and Ellsworth burglarized Johnston's residence and Asbell killed Johnston earlier that morning around 3 a.m.

Police stated Asbell, Ellsworth, and Johnston entered St. Jude's Cemetery in Monroe City earlier that night where Asbell used a handgunto kill her.

Asbell then tried concealing the murder by driving Johnston's car from the cemetery and cleaning the inside of the vehicle.

Officials also stated that Ellsworth helped Asbell attempt to

conceal and destroy evidence by helping him remove Johnston's body from thecemetery.

Asbell was arrested Thursday on charges of first-degree kidnapping, second-degree assault, and armed criminal action after a 911 hangupwas made.

According to court documents, a call was received Wednesday evening from a female who was "not acting right" and "abruptly" hung up thephone.

Officers arrived and entered the residence where the call originated after a woman answered the door with multiple abrasions on her faceand a bleeding ear.

The unnamed woman told police Asbell had struck her face and body multiple times and chased her with a kitchen knife after demanding

money he claimed she had stolen.

The woman also told officers that
Asbell took her phone and hid it

after she attempted to call for help.
According to officials, Asbell initially cooperated with officers but later began to fight.

Afterward, police discovered a needle with "clear substance" in his right front pocket, and that he had two Social Security cards and afood stamp card that did not belong to him.

Monroe County Associate Judge Michael Wilson ordered Asbell held without bond.
