Two Van-Far Students Attain 36 ACT Score

Van-Far juniors, Cameron Jones and Ennis Childs, received word last week that both earned a perfect score of 36 on the American College Test better known as the ACT. According to Statista.com, the ACT "is one of the leading college and university entrance exams in the United States. The ACT tests reading, grammar, science, and math, as well as an optional writing supplement. Each section of the test is scored on a scale of 1 to 36, whereby test takers earn one point for every correct answer, and do not lose any

points for wrong answers. The final score for each test section is then averaged to find the composite score, which is also scored between 1 and 36."

The other main college entrance exam in the U.S. is the SAT.

According to the ACT.org's 2020 statistics, the average composite score for Missouri test takers was 20.7 with an estimated 78 percent of graduates tested, which was just above the 20.6 national average out of 1,670,497 students tested.

While a score of 21 or higher qualifies the student as above aver-

age, a score in the 30s is considered very good.

A perfect 36 is the rarest score. According to researchers at the prespscholar.com and based on ACT organization's released data, less than half a percent (.334 percent) earn the 36 score. That's only 5,579 out of the 1.6 million who took the test.

Earlier this month, Jones received top honors at the conference and district competition in Quiz Bowl and helped the team claim their first ever State win.

Both look well on their way to promising futures.

Bobcats Win First District Title In School History Lady Cats Bring Home Second Place Hardware

Bowling Green School District will get to add another banner to the many accolades surrounding fans and students in the high school gym.

For the first time in school history, the boy's track and field team have earned a district title with 11 top-four performances. The top four in each event move on from districts to the sectionals in Montgomery County this Saturday where the top four at that meet will qualify for the state competition.

"It was a great day for both the boys and the girls track teams," Athletic Director and Field and Track Head Coach, Matt Chance told The Tribune. "The district meet is a long, drawn-out day, but I felt our kids did a great job in being prepared for each of their events. We had a great day in the field events to once again open up a nice lead in the team standings for both boys and girls."

A strong showing on the track helped maintain that lead set by the athletes in the field events.

"We had some nice surprises in the running events and our kids just competed at a high level," Chance said. "The sectional meet that we will be in on Saturday at Montgomery County is always one of the most competitive in the state. The top four athletes in each event will qualify for the state championships. I think our kids will be ready to compete."

At the district meet, Michael and Marcus Starks racked up points for the boy's team by qualifying in seven events. Both competed in the triple jump with Marcus taking 3 at 12.37-meters and Michael in fourth at 12.30 and again in the 110-meter hurdles where Marcus claimed second with a PR, and Michael qualified in fourth. Michael won the high jump with a

height of 1.83 meters followed by Gunnar Bryant who jumped for third and set a new PR with 1.78 meters.

Bryant set another PR in the javelin and walked away with the first-place medal with Dylan Dalton throwing just short to claim second.

Matt Jennings will be soaring in the pole vault competition along with Tanner Turner in Montgomery County. Jennings cleared 2.89 m, but quickly found his feet in time to help Dalton, Brian Fosdick, and Brandon Gamm qualify in the 4x200 relay.

Devin Rue and Teddy Charlton qualified in the discus earning second and third respectively while Colton Hearn set a new PR in the 800 meters and edged out a Hermann runner for fourth.

Ben Chance edged out a Whitfield runner by two seconds in the 3200-meter run and set a new PR of 10:14.38.

Not to be outdone, the girl's team earned a second-place finish in Wright City adding another eight athletes to the roster for Saturday's events.

Kelley Lewis blazed down the track to set PRs in the 100 and 200 meters claiming first in the 200 and helping her teammates Jordyn Stafford, Tanner Turner, and Kasie Orf win the 4x100 and 4x200 events.

Andrea Korte earned a spot in next week's competition for both shot put and discus, fellow teammate Aleece Walker will be joining her in shot put.

Haylee Chandler had a busy weekend. Not only did she graduate salutatorian, but she also earned her way to the sectional in the discus and won first in the javelin throw with an impressive throw of 38.81 meters. Megan Niemeyer launched a javelin for a PR and the second-place win in that event. She'll join Chandler at the sectional

meet. Orf set a new PR and snagged first place in the long jump at a distance of 5.04 meters. Stafford not only helped her team in the 4x100 and 4x200 relays, but she also earned herself a spot in next week's competition for the high jump but taking 4th at 1.34 meters.

The district meet showing was only one of a recent string of victories and PRs for the Bowling Green team. At the EMO conference meet the previous week, several members set PRs only recently broken in the district qualifiers.

"The girls performed at a very high level," Matt Chance said of the EMO meet. "It was their best meet of the year, and I was really proud of the effort from everyone. We had a lot of personal best and all-conference performances. Montgomery has a very good team and earned the conference title on the girl's side."

Four athletes were named as the Most Valuable after that meet. Kelley Lewis was voted EMO Most Valuable Sprinter. Michael Starks was voted EMO Most Valuable Jumper. Andrea Korte/Haylee Chandler was voted EMO Most Valuable Thrower.

According to Chance, the boy's team race came down to 3 teams - Bowling Green, Montgomery County, and North Callaway. "The boys did an outstanding job in the field events to open up a big lead in the team race," he continued. "They were very focused on each of their events and put together their best meet of the year. This team has continued to improve, and we are hoping for some big things at the district meet on Saturday."

Looks like that hope and training paid off.

The Louisiana Area Historical Museum is kicking off its summer season with a photo identification contest.

The photo was donated by Dean and

Juanita Thomas. He said the chairs in the background of the picture and the Eastern Star logo are still in the building.

Museum patrons are asked to identify the children by the number that appears next to them. A few children do not have numbers beside them, but the museum would still enjoy having them identified. Entries may be made in person or mailed to the museum at 304 Georgia Street, Louisiana, MO 63353,

and will be accepted through June 24.

The person who correctly names the most children will win a \$25 gas card. If there is a tie, the winner will be chosen by coin toss.

The museum has other new, historically significant exhibits and is preparing for a major announcement during the summer. Hours for the season will be 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturdays starting May 29.

LCBA Farmer's Market Is Opening



The Louisiana Community Betterment Assoc. has set the opening date for the only formal Farmers Market in Pike County on Wednesday, May 19, if the weather permits. If the weather continues to be an issue, the Market opening will be delayed until the following Wednesday, May 26. The market is scheduled to open in Sunset Park on Georgia Street.

The Georgia Street construction project has come to an end and getting to the Market will be a lot simpler. Georgia has been paved all the way to the 3rd. St. intersection and traffic flows through the area very smoothly. This in turn will help make getting to the market a lot easier for everyone. Operating days for the Market are every Wednesday, beginning in May and running through the second Wednesday in

October. Hours of operation are 3-6 p.m., or until products are sold out.

Sales will begin promptly at 3 p.m. "I have had several people ask why we have a starting time," stated Huckstep. "This enables all of our vendors to get properly set up and ready to sell. Without a fixed beginning time, it becomes very chaotic and the vendors are not prepared with change and proper placement of product."

There will continue to be some modified protocols that vendors will be using to ensure a safe environment for all customers. Social distancing will be in effect, customers will not be allowed to touch the produce prior to purchase, and customers will be encouraged to use hand sanitizer while visiting the market. "We are also encouraging our vendors to wash their hands fre-

quently, use hand sanitizer, gloves, keep their area clean and frequently disinfect highly touched areas. Vendors are also asked to please, not bring their product to market if they are not feeling well," stated Diana Huckstep, Market Manager. "We would also like to communicate to our customers that if they have any symptoms or if they have been exposed to someone with a known COVID-19 case to please stay home. I have been in continual contact with the Pike County Health Department and masks are not required in an open air market. The decision to wear or not to wear a mask is left to our vendors and customers discretion," stated Ms. Huckstep.

The LCBA Farmers Market is still taking applications for vendors who would like to participate. Booth fees are \$5 per space, per week. There is a season fee for anyone who is interested. Any vendor who has products that are grown or homemade within 50 miles of Louisiana are eligible to take part. "We are actively seeking any organization or individual who has a current food handling certificate to sell hamburgers, Hot Dogs, barbecue, gumbo, etc. at the market. We also seeking entertainment, such as fiddle players, guitar players, etc., during market hours," stated Huckstep. Lawmakers Wrap Up Successful Legislative Session

The 2021 Legislative Session began in January with the House Speaker calling on his colleagues to "take on even the toughest challenges" and "make the hard decisions that will improve the quality of life for Missourians of all ages." As the legislative session came to an end, the members of the Missouri House had approved numerous bills meant to help Missourians from all walks of life in all parts of the state.

In total, the General Assembly approved more than 65 bills and sent them to the governor for his approval. Legislators addressed issues such as support for foster children, protections for victims of domestic abuse, new educational opportunities for young people, safeguards for Missourians' Second Amendment rights, prohibitions against government overreach, and tax relief for Missouri families.

The General Assembly officially adjourned at 6 p.m., Friday, May 14, which concluded the portion of the legislative session when bills can be passed. The governor will now have the opportunity to act on the various bills sent to him. He has the option to sign bills into law or veto legislation he finds problematic. The legislature will return in September for an annual Veto Session in which members could potentially override any vetoes made by the governor.

Some of the priority issues passed during the 2021 session include:

EMPOWERING STUDENTS TO SUCCEED ACADEMICALLY (HB 349)

HB 349 is meant to empower parents to have access to schools

and educational resources that will best meet the needs of their children. The legislation will create Empowerment Scholarship Accounts (ESAs) to help parents afford the best educational opportunities for their kids. ESAs are meant to be "a lifeline" for many children in failing schools across the state. The accounts will empower "parents with choices and alternatives so they can find the fit that is best for them." Missourians will be able to receive a tax credit for donating to educational assistance organizations, which will provide scholarships to eligible students for a variety of costs such as tuition, tutoring, and transportation. Scholarships will be limited to students in cities with a population of 30,000 or more.

PROTECTING VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC ABUSE (SB 71 AND SBs 53 & 60)

SB 71 will allow victims of domestic abuse to obtain lifetime orders of protection against their abusers. Under current law, a court can issue an order of protection for up to one year. SB 71 will allow courts to issue protection orders for any length of time the judge feels is appropriate, up to and including a lifetime. The change is meant to spare victims from the trauma of having to revisit their abuse in court each year to extend an order of protection. The bill also adds protections against electronic stalking.

ENHANCING SUPPORT FOR FOSTER & ADOPTIVE PARENTS (HB 429 AND HB 430)

HB 429 and HB 430 will provide additional financial assistance to Missouri families who provide a stable home to children in need. HB 429 authorizes an income tax deduc-

tion for Missouri taxpayers for the expenses related to providing care as a foster parent. The bill will authorize a deduction of up to \$5,000 for married couples or single parents, provided that individuals who are married but file separately can only claim up to \$2,500 each. The bill also contains additional improvements to the state's adoption regulations and proceedings.

HB 430 expands the state's exist-

ing \$10,000 tax credit to any child adopted by Missouri taxpayers on or after January 1, 2022. Currently the credit applies only to adoptions of special needs children. The bill also increases the annual limit on the amount of tax credits that can be authorized from \$2 million to \$6 million. The bill also expands the tax credits for contributions to domestic violence shelters and maternity homes.

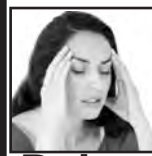

NECAC Welcomes Broadband Effort

The not-for-profit North East Community Action Corporation (NECAC) is welcoming a new program that will help lower-income families and individuals connect to broadband internet services.

The Federal Communications Commission's Emergency Broadband Benefit provides a discount of up to \$50 a month toward service for eligible households. They also can receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to buy a laptop, desktop computer or tablet for participating providers if they contribute between \$10 and \$50 toward the purchase.

"There are many households who are unable to afford or even have access to broadband services throughout our area," said NECAC Deputy

Director for Community Services Programs Janice Robinson. "This program will connect lower-income households with many services, including job search, healthcare, virtual classroom learning, the ability to connect with loved ones and much more. Without this availability, many households will simply be left behind."

Eligibility requirements include households with at least one member who:

- *Has an income at or below the 135 percent federal poverty guidelines or participates in programs such as food stamps, Medicaid or Lifeline.

- *Is approved to receive benefits under the free and reduced-price

school lunch program.

*Had a substantial loss of income due to job loss or furlough since Feb. 29, 2020, and the household had a total income in 2020 at or below \$99,000 for single federal income tax filers and \$198,000 for joint filers.

*Meets the eligibility requirements for a participating provider's existing low-income or COVID 19 program.

MO WIC Temporary Benefit Increase

The WIC Pike County Health Department is temporarily increasing the Cash Value Benefit for Fruit and Vegetable Purchases (CVB).

The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) gave USDA authority to temporarily increase the CVB to \$35 per month for eligible women and children during the federally declared COVID-19 public health emergency. Missouri WIC has elected to use this authority from June through September 2021, to provide additional healthy fruits and vegetables for up to 60,000 women and children per month. Standard CVB values range from \$9 - \$11.

WIC families have the opportunity to shop for nutritious foods at over 600 authorized WIC retailers throughout Missouri and can receive services at any of the 118 local agen-

cies. WIC serves financially eligible women, infants, and children under the age of five. Fathers, stepparents, foster parents, grandparents, and guardians are also encouraged to apply for WIC benefits for any children in the household under the age of five.

Missouri WIC provides quality nutrition education, breastfeeding promotion and support, nutritious foods, and referrals to health services. It is also one of the most successful, cost-effective, and important nutrition intervention programs in the country!

Get Hooked On Fishing With MDC Free Fishing Days June 12-13

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) invites the public to get hooked on fishing through its Free Fishing Days June 12 and 13. During Free Fishing Days, anyone may fish in the Show-Me State without having to buy a fishing permit, trout permit, or trout park daily tag.

Free Fishing Days is an annual MDC event that takes place statewide during the Saturday and Sunday following the first Monday in June.

Aside from not needing permits, other fishing regulations remain in effect during Free Fishing Days, such as limits on size and number of fish an angler may keep. Special permits may still be required at some county, city, or private fishing areas. Trespass laws remain in effect on private property.

MDC reminds anglers in Missouri that fishing permits are required before and after June 12 and 13, unless an angler is exempt by age or other factors. All other fishing regulations are also in effect.

Conservation makes Missouri a great place to fish. Missouri has more than a

million acres of surface water, and most of it provides great fishing. More than 200 different fish species are found in Missouri, with more than 20 of them being game fish for the state's more than 1.1 million anglers. Learn more about fishing in Missouri at huntfish.mdc.mo.gov/fishing.

Want to learn to fish? MDC's Discover Nature - Fishing Program provides a series of free lessons throughout the state. All fishing gear is provided. Learn more at dnf.mdc.mo.gov/

Cicadas Are Coming, But Not To Missouri

Periodical cicadas are coming in 2021, but probably not to Missouri.

University of Missouri Extension horticulturist Tamra Reall says Missourians may see some straggler cicadas from other states but not the massive swarms of noisy insects that more eastern states will see. The next brood to emerge in Missouri will not appear until 2024.

Periodical cicadas, as opposed to their larger annual counterparts, emerge every 13 or 17 years in late May to early July.

Cicadas are noisy and overwhelming. But they are also magical, says Reall.

"They are magical because of how rarely they emerge. Their scientific genus reflects this - Magicicada," says Reall, who has a background in entomology. "Just take time to reflect on the cool factor."

This heavy-bodied insect features large, red compound eyes and membranous wings. Adults are an inch long and have a 3-inch wingspan.

While some find them annoying, periodical cicadas are mostly harmless, Reall says. They might damage young trees

when the female deposits her eggs into small stems. Prevent this by covering with cheesecloth or mosquito netting. Generally, healthy trees will do fine without chemical treatment, she says.

Before they emerge, periodical cicadas may build earthen chimneys or towers that extend 2-4 inches above the soil surface. Soon after they emerge, the males make their shrill, rhythmic mating call from dawn to evening. The volume increases as the temperature rises.

Though sometimes confused with locusts, which are a type of grasshopper, periodical cicadas are more closely related to leafhoppers and aphids. They emerge in such large numbers that predators cannot eat all of them.
