High school juniors entered the 2022 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2020 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each

The number of semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

To become a finalist, the semifi nalist and a high school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, in which they provide information about the semifinalist's academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, and honors and awards received. A semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by a high school official, write an essay, and earn SAT® or ACT® scores that confirm the student's earlier performance on the qualifying test.

Pike County Health Department Has Third, Booster Doses

Our agency is now offering the third Dose & Booster Dose COVID-19 vaccines. Please read the following information carefully.

Recently the Moderna & Pfizer COVID-19 vaccines have been approved for third doses for the moderately to severely immunocompromised. At this time only the Pfizer vaccine has been approved for Booster doses that are available to those who fit the criteria listed below. The CDC has released guidance as to what individuals are able to receive the third and booster dose and they are specific to who and when they can be received. Please see below the information to understand if you are eligible to receive a third dose or booster dose.

Who can receive the MODERNA or PFIZER third dose? You must have ALL of the below scenarios:

If you have previously received your first and second dose of Moderna OR Pfizer COVID-19 Vaccine. Vaccine

brands are interchangeable. If it has been at least 28 days since your second dose was administered.

If you fall into one of the following ategories as being moderately to severely immunocompromised:

Been receiving active cancer treatment for tumors or cancers of the blood Received an organ transplant and are aking medicine to suppress the immune

Received a stem cell transplant within the last two years or are taking medicine to suppress the immune system Moderate or severe primary immun-odeficiency (such as DiGeorge syn-drome, Wiskott-Aldrich syndrome)

ADVANCED OR UNTREATED **HIV INFECTION**

Active treatment with high-dose corticosteroids or other drugs that may suppress your immune response

Who can receive the PFIZER Booster Dose? You must have ALL of the below

If you have previously received your first and second dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine.

If it has been at least six months since your second dose was administered. If you fall into at least one of the following categories:

high risk of severe COVID-19 with underlying medical conditions

Editor's note: Following is the first part of a story series by awardwinning print and broadcast journalist, historian and public relations professional Brent Engel of Louisiana.

James Carson Jamison had the kind of wanderlust that prompted him to get out of Pike County as quickly as he could.

But, as with many who roam far and wide, he came back. Best of all, he chronicled his experiences as part of an ill-conceived and disastrous effort to expand American influence.

"In the days of my boyhood, the vouths of my native state glowed with an ardor for journeying into far places in search of fortune and stirring adventure," he wrote.

Jamison was born on a farm that one publication called a "wild tract of land" along Guinn's Creek southeast of Paynesville on Sept. 30,

He was the 10th of 12 children to John Cowden and Margaret Torrence Jamison, who had married in North Carolina before moving to Missouri in 1827. Older siblings Margaret and Adam, and younger brothers, Alexander and J.C., were also born in the Show-Me State.

From early on, Jamison appeared restless. He was a fiery teenager living with a Pike County cousin when the Mexican War erupted in 1846.

"I was wild to reach the army and enlist, but two handicaps opposed me: I had no horse nor money with which to buy one," Jamison noted.

Railroads and telegraphs had not reached Pike County, so getting around without a steed meant walking long distances. A third factor was Jamison's age.

"Despair settled upon me at the prospect of remaining in the monotony of farm life," he admitted. "I never entirely lost hope, however, that something would turn up to carry me to strange lands."

Every chance he got, Jamison went into Paynesville and listened as the men of the community talked about the war. It was there that he heard about an infantry company in Troy that was seeking recruits.

Jamison borrowed a horse from a local doctor and rode to Lincoln County, where, despite his age, he was accepted and took the oath. His joy soon turned to sadness when President James Polk revoked the recruitment order.

'This was the bitterest grief that had come to me since the death of my father in 1845, which had scattered his children among strangers," Jamison said.

The anguish didn't last long. In 1849, the six-foot-tall, 170-pound Jamison joined a party headed by wagon to California. They crossed the Missouri River on April 5. Jamison later caught up with another westbound wagon train, which included a steamboat crewman and a future Civil War general. They arrived in Sacramento on Oct. 9.

Jamison lived and worked in such mining camps as "Rough and in Nevada County and "Todd's Valley" in Placer County. The primitive camps were so isolated that news was at a premium, with a two-cent paper going for a \$1 pinch of gold dust.

"Frequently he walked ten miles afoot to meet the stage coach to get The Republican, a St. Louis newspaper, and paid a dollar per issue," according to an article in the Chronicles of Oklahoma.

It was while panning for gold that Jamison first heard about William Walker, a Tennessee lawyer and journalist who had aspirations of colonizing lands south of the American border.

Pike Chapter NSDAR Re-Dedicates Revolutionary War Grave

County Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) held a re-dedication ceremony at the Pleasant Hill Cemetery west of Frankford on Saturday, Sept. 11 at 11 a.m.

The lengthy process of applying for and receiving permission to rededicate a veteran's official grave marker began this past year by then Chapter Regent, Marilyn Johnson and was originally to take place on May 15, 2021. However, Johnson unexpectedly died April 23. She had been a 23-year member of the Pike County Chapter, NSDAR, joining on June 6, 1998, and was a descendant of John Thomas Layne. The ceremony was rescheduled for Sept. 11—to coincide with "Patriot Day."

Pvt. Thomas Layne (1754-1825—last name also shown as Lane) was from and served in Virginia as a Private in Capt. Samuel Jordan Cabell's Company, 6th Virginia Regiment, commanded by Lieut. Col. James Hendricks, 1777. After his discharge, he brought his wife and twelve children from Virginia to settle on a farm in the Frank-

The Louisiana, Missouri, Pike ford, Missouri area. According to records, DAR members had originally placed a marker in the 1930's, which was later claimed by the rav-



The Pike County Chapter has worked on projects and placed various plaques in and around Louisiana. To name just a few, members were responsible for the granite Buffalo Fort monument (in 1917) south of Louisiana on Route D; provided stone pillars and a retaining wall for the old Louisiana High School on Jackson Street; raised funds to erect stone walls with the ornamental gate at the Riverview Cemetery main entrance in 1911 and replaced the damaged entrance in 2008. Members also recently worked with the city hall's project on updating cemetery records.

In addition to honoring veterans, there have been many other areas of accomplishment for the members of the Pike County Chapter since it's organization on Feb. 10, 1911. 110 years and still counting! DAR is dedicated to "historical preservation, education and patriotism"—always with "God, Home and Country" in the foreground.



One of the highest tenants of ethical

hunting is the concept of fair chase. Baiting deer goes against fair chase by giving a hunter an unfair advantage. It is also illegal. But with a fatal disease threatening Missouri's deer population,

the consequences of baiting could have a far more negative impact than the deer

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds hunters that taking deer by use of bait is prohibited by

"Deer baiting is putting out some sort

Problems with deer baiting are amplified due to the presence of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) in the St. Louis

Region. CWD is a neurological disease

that is fatal to deer. The disease has

been confirmed in Jefferson, Franklin, and Crawford counties in MDC's St.

Louis region, as well as 15 other coun-

ties elsewhere in the state. A total of 206 Missouri free-ranging deer have tested

"When you concentrate deer in a certain area the spread of disease is more likely," explained Corley. "So, we're trying to keep the spread of it down. We

Bowling Green Bids Police Chief A Happy Retirement not worry about the phone ringing,"

Each weekday morning, employees and regular customers at Bowling Green's South Abels gas station see a familiar face often in a pristine

Bowling Green's retiring Police Chief, Don Nacke, starts his day there grabbing one of his favorite drinks – a Diet Mountain Dew – and more importantly, talking to the peo-

Often Chief Nacke gets a feel on the pulse of the city there and hears about what's going on from the citizens and employees before ever stepping foot in the police department.

It's a morning ritual that may become less frequent in the following weeks as he prepares to transition to civilian life. It's also one of the things Nacke says he'll miss the most... talking with people.

For the last seven years, Nacke has held the role of Bowling Green Police Chief which caps off a long career in law enforcement.

He began his career in law enforcement at 21-years old in October of 1974. By the time he helps the new police chief step into the role, Nacke will have been a cop almost 47 years to the day.

"I started in 1974 as a dispatcher for the Sheriff's Department," Nacke told The Tribune. Although originally from St. Charles, Mo, he was living in Elsberry at the time and commuted back and forth to Bowling Green. "I worked there [PCSD] for a while and then sometime in late 74 took a job with the Elsberry Police Department."

He stayed with the Elsberry PD for about nine months before returning to the Pike County Sheriff's Department where he stayed for 30-years.

"I got to be friends with a state trooper back in the day, and he's the one who brought me up to Pike County," he explained when asked how a young man from the city found himself working with the Pike County Sheriff's Department. "My trooper friend introduced me to Sheriff Jenkins who ended up hiring me to be a dispatcher."

Nacke returned as a deputy in the summer of 1975.

"Back then the training requirements were based on the size of the county you're in," he continued. "The only place we could go for training was to the Missouri State Highway Patrol academy for a three-week class. Since then, I've been to all kinds of other training, but that's how it all started. Back then you only had to have three weeks. Now it's around six hundred hours of training needed.'

Although Nacke relocated from St. Charles to Pike County, one of the biggest challenges he's had at the BGPD is retaining young officers. It's a common problem for rural communities, especially in Pike County.

"We've pretty well stayed about the same number of officers since I've been chief," he said. "Keeping the officers is the biggest problem. We're like a training ground for some. They come here, get some training and move on. We've had some go to the St. Louis area, and we just can't compete with that kind

As with many lines of work, it takes a strong support system and love for the career to stay with it for so long. Nacke found that support with his wife of over 40 years, Michele (Shelley). Shelly is a retired educator and school counselor with Clopton School District. She now provides counseling services throughout the area and devotes time to projects such as Anne's Anchor in

Bowling Green. They have two children, Jacob and Megan.

Jacob followed in his father's footsteps and is a lieutenant with the Hannibal Police Department.

Their daughter, Megan, lives in Edinburg, Texas where she's an athletic trainer at a large school district.

According to Nacke, his family almost couldn't believe that he was retiring from the profession. "Finally? You're finally going to do it?"

It's an understandable viewpoint for them since they watched him retire from the sheriff's department in 2004 and not long after took a position with the county's Juvenile Office where he worked with troubled

While Nacke couldn't speak about details, he said his 10-years there was an interesting experience.

Maybe carrying over from that time, he said drugs are one the biggest issues he sees in the community but also culture.

"People will go into places like Walmart and steal something and they don't care. When you go to arrest them, they say 'well, I needed it," he states matter of factly. "Some people don't seem to care anymore."

During his time in law enforcement, he's tried to influence positive change with young people who found themselves in trouble with the

It's a role - if not always intentional – that he has found himself assuming more often late in his career as he became Bowling Green's Police Chief in 2014.

According to employees at City Hall, "although [Nacke] was their police chief, he still took the role at times of a father type figure.'

That possibly stems from one of his important policies.

"As police chief, it's always been my motto to have an open-door policy so if people want to come in and talk to me they can," he said. "And they have."

It goes along with another part of what he says he'll miss the most about working in law enforcement.

"The people. I love to talk to people. I'll miss the people I work with," he explained. "Whenever I go shopping somewhere, I can't get out of the store because everyone wants to talk with me."

And of those people that he's tried to help even during some of the lowest points of their lives?

"I see people who I've sent to prison in years past and we talk. Sometimes they even act we're best friends." When asked if thinks that happens because he impacted their lives in a good way. "Well, I hope. I think it's because I treat everyone fairly. That's always been my motto.

So, what is something he won't miss about the job?

"Being able to take an easy and

he laughed. "Being chief the phone rings a lot."

As of this writing, the City of Bowling Green has had 14 applications for the new police chief although according to Bowling Green City Administrator, Linda Luebrecht, not all have been interviewed.

The city council is expected to make a decision soon about who will become the new chief. Nacke will remain there until that decision is made.

"I've known the Chief for many years, but I've only worked with him for three years," Luebrecht said. "He has always been easy to work with and talk to. We're really going to miss him and miss giving him a hard time. I know he is ready for retirement and a short vacation on the beach, but he will be filling in until a new Chief is hired. He will also still be a volunteer with the Fire De-

Whoever gets the job, Chief Nacke hopes they continue with some of his practices even some of the old school approaches he had a tendency towards when necessary.

"I hope the new chief carries on some of my beliefs. I'm kind of a stickler on uniforms and the officers looking professional when they're out on the streets.'

Even though he and Shelly might be ready for that vacation, Nacke is going to remain active in retirement.

"I plan or hope to find a part-time job but not in law enforcement," he said. "I used to always joke around that I wanted to be a greeter at Walmart, but not anymore. They don't have that position now.

As Luebrecht explained, he also volunteers with the city's fire department. Something he's done for over 30 years.

"I'm the assistant chief, but I've done lots of things there and I've been the chief in the past," he explained. "I'm going to remain there as long as I can. As long as I've got good health and can do the job."

When asked which he's had more excitement in, "definitely the law enforcement. I've seen a lot of crazy situations."

Nacke wanted to thank the city for hiring him and having faith that he could do the job.

"Don has been a great chief and we're going to miss him," Bowling Green Mayor, Jim Arico, said at the retirement party. "We wish him the best in retirement."

When asked if he had any advice for the next chief?

'No," he chuckled. "Not yet, but I'll be around for a few weeks to help them with everything that's going on, so they won't be blind-

Chief Nacke has gone out of his way to help citizens in various situations, but you'll never hear that from him. Even during the retirement party, he stood waiting patiently and looked almost unsure about all the fuss. He's humbly leaving the career and allowing his daily interactions to speak louder than words ever could.

"I'm kind of a quiet guy. I don't look for a lot of praise, I just do my






