# **Graves Introduces Bill To Protect Landowner Rights**

Graves introduced the Rails to Trails Landowner Rights today. bill The Act landowner strengthens rights to stop federal land seizures.

"Our right to own property, to farm, and to provide for our families is sacred," said Graves. "The Founding Fathers sought to protect landowners from government land grabs with the Fifth Amendment. Sadly, bureaucrats Washington don't seem to miss an opportunity to go after our rights. They've got to be held accountable so we can protect landowner rights and stop these federal land grabs."

The Rails to Trails Landowner Rights Act reigns in the Surface Transportation Board's Rails to Trails pro-

eral government to take former railroad corridors and give those corridors to third parties for use as recreational trails. This broken process violates the constitutional rights of landowners and unfairly cuts them out of the process. Graves' legislation would require trail sponsors to get sign off from all impacted landowners and fully compensate landowners when a project moves forward.

# A Shot And Stripped

Wounded Man Survives Naked Trek During Civil War

Editor's note: Following is the final part of a story series by contributing writer Brent

Simon Branstetter had a long way to go.

Ten days after being shot in the chest, stripped of all but a shirt and left for dead by Confederates, the Union sergeant was healing. The bullet had punctured the right lung and exited just below the shoulder blade after he surrendered to troops under Sterling Price.

Unfortunately, he was behind enemy lines near the Missouri-Arkansas border about 100 miles from the nearest federal garrison.

The choices were to walk or turn himself in, and Branstetter had almost been killed the first time he put his hands up.

So, he decided to traverse

what a fellow soldier called "the roughest part of Missouri," where residents "look at us with a sort of scary suspicion. Hailing from Curryville,

Branstetter certainly was used to such reactions. Throughout the Civil War, Pike Countians were just about evenly split in their loyalties, and had to be careful in whom they placed

"While it is true that our county has few who are willing to avow themselves secessionists per se, it cannot be disguised that we have quite a number who are so in fact," the Louisiana Union newspaper declared.

Missouri did not secede. Since enlisting with the Third Missouri Cavalry on April 14, 1862, Branstetter had been determined to keep it that way.

Benton County Judge E.C. Scott took in Branstetter and aided in his recovery, providing his guest with food, brown jeans, a shirt, socks and shoes. A rebel doctor who lived nearby initially refused to treat the Union soldier, but came to check on him several times during the convalescence. The physician even provided a hat.

"On the evening of the last date, I felt that I was able to walk, and, getting up, paced the floor and tried my limbs until I found that I could probably make some headway at traveling," Branstetter wrote in his

The judge's wife "baked me some cornbread in order that I might have something to eat in my proposed walk across the country," he added.

After about four hours of plodding northeast toward Patterson, Branstetter came to a log cabin where he "found a genuine old Irish farmer and his wife. That old woman at once asked me if I would like some buttermilk and cornbread to eat, which invitation I readily grasped and she sat before me a liberal portion of probably all that she had to

The couple also gave Branstetter a worn coat, which came in handy on the cool September nights. The sergeant had become wiser since first telling the Confederate-sympathizing Scott his true identity. Wearing "such clothes that I

looked just as one of Price's stragglers might appear if dismounted, I continued on my way, playing the part of a rebel soldier who had been sick and left behind." Branstetter grew worried

when he learned Pilot Knob had fallen to the enemy, so a change of course to the east was made. A sigh of relief came upon

entering Jackson the morning of Oct. 3. The town was under Union control. Branstetter was given a mule and a guide, who led him to Cape Girardeau.

"On the way, the mule fell down, pitching me over his head and for a short time I thought I would die from the pain in my wounds, which were not yet healed," he said. "But I regained sufficient strength in a short while to remount the mule and made my way to the hospital at Cape Girardeau."

At first, authorities were skeptical about Branstetter's story, but within an hour he was recognized by a regimental baker with whom he had earlier served. After a bath, his wound was dressed by a surgeon and he was given a clean cot.

"I had my first assurance that I was in the hands of friends and that my chances were probably good for a final recovery," Branstetter said. "The change was so great from what I have endured for the past two weeks that I felt as though I had been admitted within the gates of paradise."

On Oct. 12, Branstetter was transferred to a St. Louis hospital for a month. On Nov. 27 while William Tecumseh Sherman's Union troops torched Sandersville, Ga., on their March to the Sea – the sergeant married Nancy Jane Chamberlain in Pike County. On Dec. 18, he rejoined his regiment at St. Joseph. An honorable discharge came at Macon on June 10, 1865.

Afterward, Branstetter moved to Vandalia and resumed farming on 212 acres. He and Nancy had eight children - Flora, Artemas, Theron, Lou, Hugh, Daisy, Walter and Byrde.

Branstetter was awarded a military pension by Congress and patented agricultural products that included a "car coupling" and a "suspending device." He died in December 1932, four days before his 92nd birthday.

As with so many Civil War veterans, Branstetter did not brag about his service, but the book "History of Pike County, Missouri" offered praise.

"When the dark clouds of war hung like a pall over our country, he was among those brave men who went out in defense of the old flag.

# **Man Indicted In 2009 Pil**

A man originally charged in connection with a 2009 homicide has now been formally indicted by a grand jury, according to Pike County Sheriff Stephen Korte.

Stephen H. Palmer, 50, formerly of Gazette, was indicted on August 1, 2025, for first-degree murder, armed criminal action, and second-

degree arson in connection with the March 2009 death of Larry W. Moore, 56, of rural Middletown. Bond has been set at \$250,000.

Palmer was initially arrested in 2009 following a fatal fire at Moore's residence on State Route AC. Investigators discovered Moore's body inside the burned structure, and an autopsy later confirmed Moore had died prior to the fire from apparent stab

wounds to the chest.

Palmer, who had recently moved in with Moore, was apprehended in April 2009 after attempting to cross the U.S.-Mexico border in a stolen Jeep. He was returned to Missouri and charged, but in November 2009, custody was transferred to the Missouri Department of Mental Health after he was deemed unfit to stand trial.

According to Sheriff Korte, the Pike County Prosecutor's Office learned in late 2024 that Palmer was no longer being held in a secure facility. Although he remained under the jurisdiction of the Department of Mental Health and a court-appointed conservator, steps were taken to revive the case. The result was last week's grand jury indictment.

Authorities say the investigation into Moore's death remains active, including questions about motive. Palmer is currently in custody.

All suspects are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.



#### **Too Much Moisture Can Hinder Root** Development

It might sound bizarre, but all the rain many parts of Missouri got this year has primed plants, trees and shrubs for the possibility of drought damage.

Roots are the lifeline of a plant, taking up water and nutrients from the soil and moving them into the leaves, where they can interact with sunlight to produce energy for the plant. A robust root system is the foundation of a healthy, vigor-

"The roots of plants need oxygen to respire just like you and I need oxygen," said David Trinklein, horticulture state specialist for University of Missouri Extension. "When it rains a lot, the pores in the soil that had contained oxygen are filled with water. Thus, the roots become oxygen-deprived, at times to the point of death," he said. Even if roots survive, prolonged waterlogging or lack of oxygen tends to stress roots and make them more susceptible to root rots and anaerobic pathogens. For most plants, including

woody plants such as trees and shrubs, the deepest roots will succumb first to waterlogged soil and only the shallow roots survive. This is because there is more oxygen toward the surface of the soil. Plants gardeners established

this past spring face the same problem. They haven't sent their roots deep into the soil because they have not been forced to do so. The top several inches of soil have been a haven for roots, containing all the water and air they needed, Trinklein said.

Here's the problem: When the rains subside and temperatures soar, the water in the top layer of the soil disappears very quickly. This can result in drought injury even though yearly rainfall totals have been above average.

# **MDC**, Partners To Host Third Annual **Mentored Deer Hunt Oct. 10-12**

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) will partner with multiple organizations to host the Third Annual Governor's Mentored Deer Hunt scheduled for Friday, Oct. 10 through Sunday, Oct. 12. Mentored hunts will take place in several counties during Missouri's early firearms antlerless deer season.

The mentored hunts are made possible through partnerships with the Conservation Federation of Missouri, National Wild Turkey Federation, National Deer Association, Missouri Hunting Heritage Foundation, Pheasants & Quail Forever, Kansas City Safari Club International, Missouri Disabled Sportsmen, Missouri's Legislative Sportsmen's Caucus, Whitetails Unlimited, ALPS Outdoorz, Dead End Game Calls, MO Woods and Wildand Missouri Back

Country Hunters and Anglers.

"These partners have come together to host events endorsed by Governor Mike Kehoe that mentor new hunters and manage deer populations for participating landowners," said MDC Education and Outreach Coordinator Rob Garver. "This is a great opportunity for people to learn more about hunting and get a chance to harvest their first deer.'

During the weekend, participants will not only go a field with their mentor to hunt, but also learn about hunting's role in conservation, deer biology, hunting strategy and etiquette, firearm safety, and more.

The deadline to register is Sunday, Aug. 31. Those interested will first register on the MDC website at http://short.mdc.mo.gov/4t X. Once registered, users will be contacted to fill out

an application. Preference will be given to applicants who have never hunted or never harvested a deer. Mentored hunts will be held in Audrain, Benton, Howell, Madison, Maries, Phelps, Osage, Pike, Putnam, and Shelby counties.

Selected applicants will need to purchase a Firearms Antlerless Deer Hunting Permit or a Firearms Any-Deer Hunting Permit.
